

Thirty first Sunday in Ordinary Time

This weekend we continue to read from Mark's Gospel. Jesus is in Jerusalem. The final days of Jesus in Jerusalem was filled with much action. His entry into Jerusalem, his cleansing of the

Temple, and the questioning of Jesus' authority by the chief priests, scribes, and elders are all significant moments. This weekend we will hear one of the scribes addressing Jesus with a question. "Which is the first of all the commandments?"

Jesus summarized the whole Jewish law into love of God and neighbor. He wanted his listeners to understand that it is not possible to love God sincerely without loving the people whom God has made in His own image and likeness. St. John makes this point clear when he says, "Who ever does not love a brother whom he has seen cannot love God whom he has not seen" (1 John 4:20). The dual commandments of love that Jesus gave are taken from the Old Testament. The first part about the love of God was taken from the famous Shema: "Hear O Israel: The Lord your God is one Lord; and you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your might" (Deuteronomy 6:4). The Shema emphasizes the unity of God and the obligation to love the one God. The second part about love of neighbor was taken from Leviticus 19:18: "Love your neighbor as yourself."

What is remarkable about these two rules is that probably no Rabbi in the past had synthesized these two passages as Jesus did. The old concept of religion relegated the love of neighbor to the background, but Jesus made the love of neighbor inseparable with the love of God. In fact, the life of Jesus is an embodiment of the love of God and neighbor. What makes the instruction of Jesus about love so unique is that He asks His followers not to discriminate against anyone, irrespective of religion, race, tribe or social class. Jesus teaches us that our love of God is incomplete unless we love everyone and respect everyone because everyone is made in the image and likeness of God.

November 2nd which is this Saturday, also the first Saturday of November, is the Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed (All Souls Day). It's is a holy day set aside for honoring the dead. On this day we remember and pray for all those who have gone to eternal rest. Many Christians visit cemeteries where their loved ones are buried. Please pray for the dead, especially the holy souls in purgatory.


Family Fun Night!!! Friday, November 8th 6:00 - 9:00 PM

* For the elderly who are homebound or unvisited, may the Lord fill them with his presence and comfort them with friendship.


