

~ PASTOR LETTER ~



Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time

In the Gospel passage this weekend, we witness a profound moment where the disciples, especially Simon Peter, encounter the divine presence of Jesus at the sea of Galilee. In the narrative we find that Jesus instructs Peter to cast his net into

deeper waters after a fruitless night of fishing. The result is a miraculous catch, overwhelming in both quantity and significance. Witnessing this, Peter falls to his knees, exclaiming, "Depart from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man." Peter's reaction is one of fear, rooted in the awareness of his sinfulness and the overwhelming holiness of Jesus.

However, it is precisely in these moments of fear and selfawareness that God's transformative grace is revealed. Jesus' response to Peter is not one of rejection but of invitation and reassurance. "Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching men."

Jesus acknowledges Peter's fear but redirects it towards a new purpose, emphasizing that it is through divine holiness that our lives are transformed. Jesus' interaction with Peter teaches us that God's holiness is not a barrier but a bridge. It is an invitation to let go of fear and embrace the transformative power of God's grace. By acknowledging our shortcomings and surrendering to God's holiness, we can experience true freedom and purpose.

Peter's encounter with Jesus on the shores of Galilee is a powerful reminder that our sinfulness, when met with divine holiness, becomes an opportunity for grace and transformation. May we, like Peter, hear Jesus' words, "Do not be afraid," and trust in the healing and life-changing power of God's holiness. Let us not shy away from His presence but embrace it, knowing that it is through His grace that we are made whole.

Jubilee 2025—Pilgrims of Hope How did the Jubilee Year originate?

In the Old Testament, Moses set up a year-long jubilee every fifty years that was meant to be a time of restoration. Debts were canceled in order to return God's people to freedom, forgiveness and joy. In the New Testament. Jesus fulfilled the celebration of the jubilee by declaring "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because He has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor" (Luke 4:18-19). It is through Christ that we are to find freedom, forgiveness and joy.

One way to participate in Jubilee 2025 is to receive the sacraments on a more frequent basis. The sacrament of reconciliation brings liberty to captives. Allow Jesus, the Divine Physician, to help you find greater freedom through forgiveness and healing of sinful habits. The sacrament of the holy Eucharist - Jesus Himself - opens our eyes to see His power and love in action.


